## **Miscellaneous Health Expenses**

- Ambulance Charges To and From Hospital
- An amount paid to a private medical clinic that are for medically required services or are prepayment of services that are to be provided over the course of the year and are actually provided in that year (block fees) will generally be an eligible medical expense
- · Canadian Red Cross Home Maker Service
- Deaf-blind intervening services used by a person who is both blind and profoundly deaf when paid to someone in the business of providing these services
- Doctors note
- Employee Premium paid to a non-government medical or hospitalization plan (e.g. Blue Cross, Manulife Flexcare, Sun Life Affinity) Only Health, Dental, Vision premiums. No Critical Illness, Accidental Death or Dismemberment Life, or Disability Premiums
- Form The completion of health and disability forms by a medical practitioner is considered to be ancillary to the provision of medical services and the associated costs may also be claimed as an eligible medical expense under paragraph 118.2(2)(a)
- Gluten Free Products- With letter from qualified practitioner, only the difference between the cost of goods related to the part of the product consumed by the person with celiac disease
- Home Care for an illness or disability. The submission must include a letter from a licensed medical professional stating the home care is medically required in order to be eligible
- Hydraulic wheelchair lifts for a vehicle that has been prescribed by a qualified medical practitioner
- Private Healthcare-The cost of membership fees or access fees paid to a private medical clinic. Fees must be pre-payment of eligible medical expenses
- Reasonable expenses relating to rehabilitative therapy, including training in lip reading and sign language, if incurred to adjust for the patient's loss of hearing or speech
- School for persons with an impairment in physical or mental functions - a medical practitioner must certify in writing that the equipment, facilities or personnel specially provided by that school are required because of the person's physical or mental ... see myHSA site

- The cost of an animal specially trained to assist a person who is blind, deaf, or severely impaired in the use of arms or legs
- Travel (40-80km) the cost of the public transportation expenses (for example, taxis, bus, or train) when a person needs to travel at least 40 kilometers (one way), but less than 80 km, from their home to get medical services. See myHSA site for full details

- Under paragraph 118.2(2)(a) an eligible medical expense includes an amount paid to a medical practitioner, dentist or nurse or a public or licensed private hospital for medical or dental services provided to the patient
